Since starting as the Performing Arts instructor in 2012, I've had the privilege of experiencing camp in many capacities: as instructor, counsellor, head programmer, and in 2015 as Assistant Summer Director!

Brigadoon has given me the opportunity to make a meaningful difference at camp and in the experience it provides to the campers. I've watched the confidence, leadership, and silly spirits of campers, staff and volunteers grow during their time at Brigadoon. I can remember being a keen new employee in my first week and asking a senior staff member what the process was for running a certain program, and was told I was allowed to create and shape these aspects of camp. It was very empowering to feel like I had the ability to establish my own little part of what Brigadoon would become. I can also fondly remember during that week being told to put on a kilt, wacky hat and my best Scottish accent for an afternoon activity... an example of how the silly sides of both our campers and counsellors are encouraged during the summer!

One of my favourite moments from summer 2014 that captured the essence of Brigadoon was during Camp Silly-Yak. We were sitting on the dock during swim time when one of the older campers mentioned that she knows someone at her school who also has celiac disease, to which one of my ten year old campers replied, "You're so lucky, I don't have any friends who have celiac!" Her eyes then lit up as she shouted, "WAIT! ALL OF YOU ARE MY FRIENDS WHO HAVE CELIAC!" That moment of realizing she now has people who understand her situation is another example of why Brigadoon is such a unique, brilliant, and magical place!

New Kayaks

Thanks to the generosity of the Rotary Club of Kentville, Brigadoon was able to purchase three new kayaks and four paddles with which campers and families enjoyed exploring Aylesford Lake throughout the season.



New Boardwalk & Platform

Thanks to the generous time, resources and hard work of several volunteers, Brigadoon Village gained a new 200 foot long accessible boardwalk and platform on our newly acquired beach! Through the new government land acquisition, Brigadoon received approval to build a boardwalk through the surrounding land to a natural beach area. This boardwalk now provides campers with an accessible trail to enter a natural graded entry beach for swimming and other activities!

New Playground Equipment

Campers enjoyed a brand new sandbox, sun shade, puppet theatre, navigation play wheel, and spotterscope! We will be continuing playground upgrades in 2015.

New Soundfield System

The new sound system, which clarifies and amplifies speech in the dining hall, was funded by the Rotary Club of Kentville.

Our new kitchen sound barrier is used to minimize the noise from the kitchen when groups are using the dining hall.



New Land Acquisition

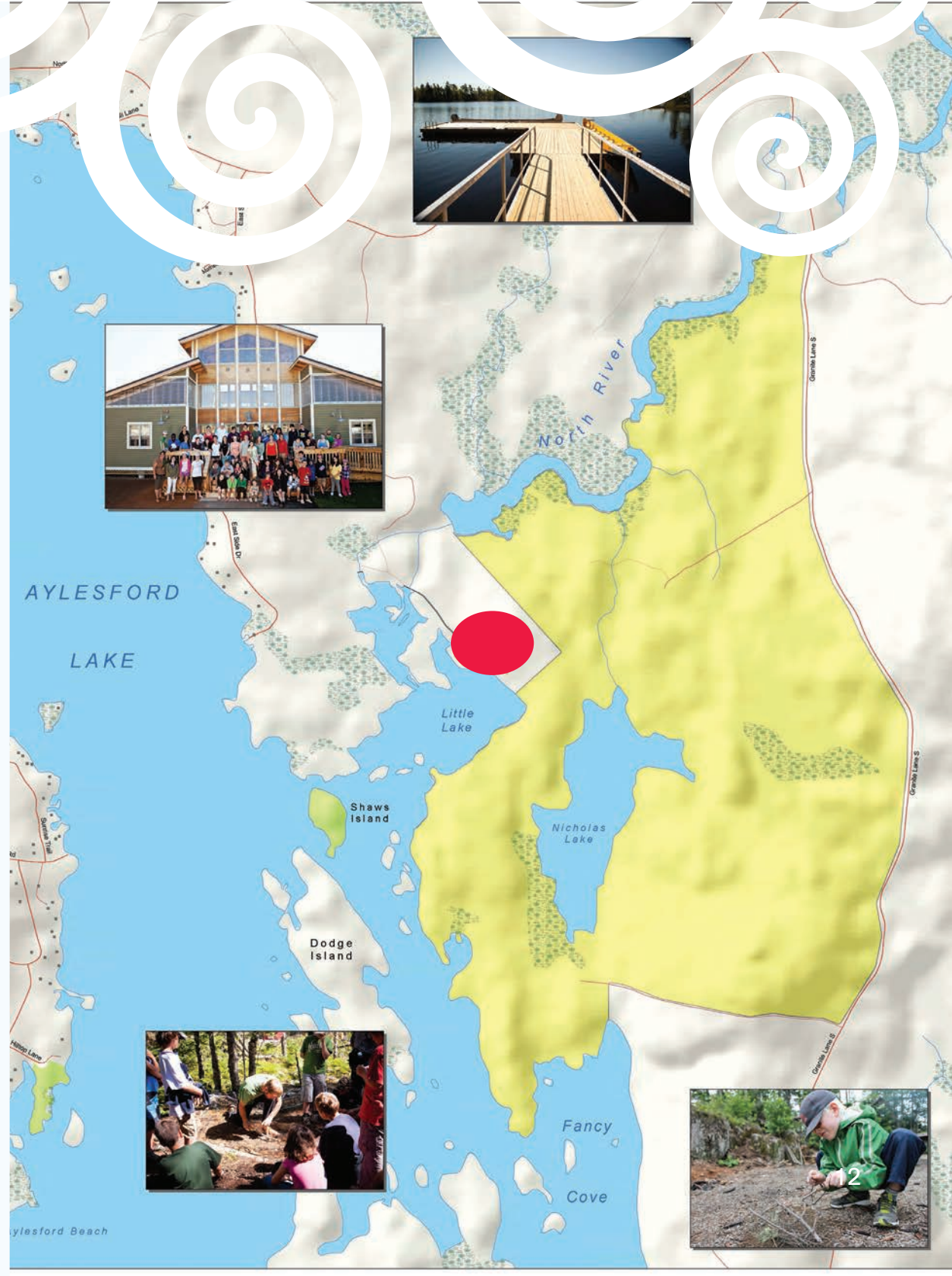
On April 28, 2014, Premier Stephen McNeil, Environment Minister Randy Delorey and Health and Wellness Minister Leo Glavine announced at Brigadoon Village that the Government of Nova Scotia had purchased 594 acres of land on Fancy Cove.

The land acquisition will play a large part in helping Brigadoon Village fill the unmet need of outdoor recreation opportunities for children living with a chronic illness, chronic condition or special need in Atlantic Canada, as well as the greater community.

Brigadoon Village can now utilize nearly 700 acres of land surrounding Aylesford Lake, meaning our campers and their families will have access to several more outdoor recreation and education opportunities throughout their camp experience.

The acquisition is part of land from Yarmouth to Cape North, Victoria Co. the province has acquired through purchase, donation, exchange and land trust agreements.

Leaders in the Making

Campers aged 15-17 can join Brigadoon's LIT (Leaders in Training) program as a Pursuit option. The goal of the LIT program is to create self-empowered leaders who give back to their camp, school and community through volunteerism. This program was led by staff member, Grace Caldwell, who developed a four day program around these themes: defining leadership through role models and understanding your own leadership style, team work and group roles, goal setting, and compassion. In addition to helping run campfires and the Carnival event at camp, LITs work with a journal and create a number of take home projects.

In 2014 our beautiful facility was enjoyed by a variety of groups throughout Brigadoon's off-season.

Brigadoon by the Numbers

In 2012, 179 campers attended Brigadoon's first full summer of programming.

In 2014, 450 campers attended Brigadoon's third full summer of programming...

(183 of which were **campers new to Brigadoon**)

...That's a growth of **250%!**

70% of campers come from Nova Scotia.

40% come from the Halifax Regional Municipality.

85% of campers were referred to Brigadoon Village by doctors and clinic staff at the IWK Health Centre.

The BIG SWIM

49 People Swam the Northumberland Strait and Raised \$300,000...

On Sunday, August 17, 49 swimmers (including three Brigadoon staff) entered the Northumberland Strait to brave the amazing feat of swimming from New Brunswick to PEI in The BIG SWIM. This year, all funds from the swim went directly toward sending Atlantic Canadian children living with chronic illness to Brigadoon's programs.

In 2013, The BIG SWIM raised \$50,000. This year's BIG SWIM goal was \$150,000. It was doubled. \$300,000 was raised for Brigadoon.

\$300,000 is the equivalent of giving 300 children the magic of a summer camp experience. Congratulations to GIVETOLIVE on such a successful event and thank you for selecting us as the recipient of funds raised. Thank you as well to all swimmers, kayakers and volunteers for your time in and out of the water. Through your incredible efforts, you've helped to ensure that 300 children will have the life changing experience of coming to Brigadoon Village. We couldn't be more thrilled, humbled and grateful.
