
1. A Touching Good-Bye

It was an emotional moment felt by everyone. All of the campers ran up after she was done and gave her a huge group hug. There were lots of happy tears!

2. Introducing the **Challenge Course**


This summer at Brigadoon was our first time using our new, fully accessible climbing wall and high ropes course. It was by far one of the most exciting thing for campers to try out, and it helped all campers push past their comfort zones to reach new confidence levels. They got to try new things and push themselves, but they were able to leave the challenge course with an immense sense of accomplishment from their experience and, perhaps best of all, have an intense feeling of ownership over their knowledge of challenges, growth and accomplishment, and to see their ability to overcome challenges. The most profound moment was when Gabi, a Carpe Diem camper with epilepsy and cerebral palsy who uses a wheelchair, climbed to the top of the climbing tower while her cabin mates cheered her on. 3. The Power of Connection

During the Canadian Cancer Society's Camp Goodtimes (for kids living with or beyond cancer), there was a beautiful moment of connection when a group of campers bonded after discovering they all had the same scar on their bodies from having a port-a-cath (a small medical device installed beneath the skin and used to deliver fluids intravenously). Together, they noticed the unique sensation and feeling the scars that they still have after their cancer treatments are long





4. Welcome Back, Camp Silly-Yak!

This year was the long-awaited return of Camp Silly-Yak (for kids with Celiac disease) after not being able to host these campers for two years during the pandemic. Our Silly-Yak campers loved taking part in cooking lessons in our new outdoor kitchen (with an oven just for gluten-free pizza!) Because of the added safety features this kitchen provides, campers have complete confidence to enjoy food without

fear of cross-contamination. One camper made and ate a cinnamon bun for the first time in her life!

5. Learning to **Grieve Out Loud**

At the end of Camp Kedooopse (a camp for kids who are grieving the loss of a family member), there's a special ceremony called the Cairn Ceremony. It combines music, reflection, and ritual to create space for campers to express their grief and any of the emotions or thoughts that define their grief for them. This year, when we invited campers to share, two of the youngest (and bravest!) campers volunteered to go first, sharing who in their life died and the circumstances around how they died. This courage made it safe for other campers to follow suit and volunteer to share their stories and feelings. Campers supported and comforted each other; no one sat alone. When someone happened to be apart from others, campers filled in spaces and closed gaps so that no one felt adrift while sitting and feeling their grief.

Not only did I learn that I was more capable than I thought, but I also learned my limits and the true meaning of self-care.
