MAGIC MOMENTS

1. We host

an evening talent show on the last full day of each camp. Campers get to showcase what is particularly special about them. During the final act of one week, a graduating camper played guitar and sang a song with his counsellor. Just as they started performing their song, it started to rain quite heavily, making it hard to hear them. Folks in the audience were getting wet, and some had left to get rain jackets.

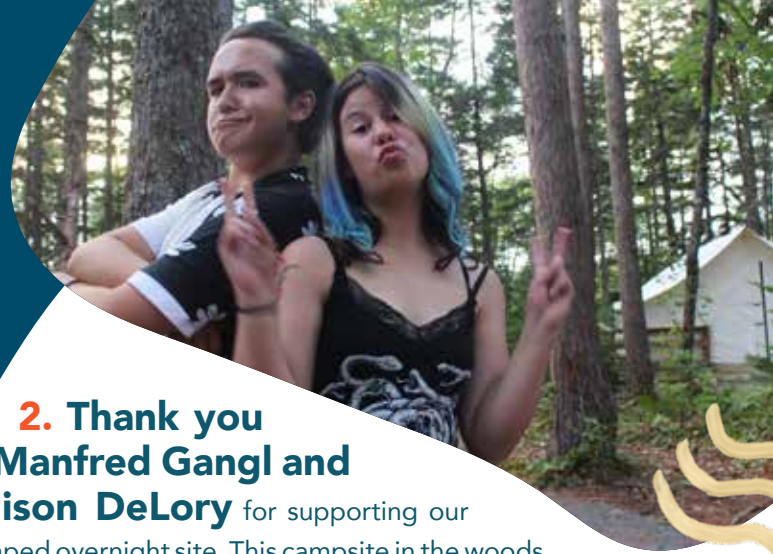
The rain eventually subsided, and we were able to get back outside for the closing campfire. We started the campfire off with another chance for this camper to perform, making sure that everyone had a chance to hear it and share in the moment. He sang and played a wonderful heartfelt song, which was an incredibly touching way to celebrate his years at camp on his last night as a camper.

for supporting our revamped overnight site. This campsite in the woods is where older campers get to spend an evening around the campfire, doing fun activities and sleeping-out in tents. Thanks to these improvements, we can now accommodate larger groups so that even more campers can experience this awesome part of camp.

Now, campers have additional space where they feel more comfortable in their sleeping arrangements, making the overnight experience more accessible. This new space provides the opportunity to connect, make great memories and enjoy delicious s'mores!

3. During the first week of summer camp, we hosted **our largest camp program yet** with 120 children and youth in the Silly Yak (celiac disease) and Leadership Programs. Having this many campers at camp was truly incredible and made things like mealtimes and gathering for campfires feel really special. All spaces were filled to the brim with campers experiencing the magic of camp.



4. We pride ourselves

on finding ways to adapt programs to allow campers to be successful, have fun, and get the most from the program no matter their needs.

We adapted the music programming for those who are deaf and hard of hearing, offering an inclusive program focusing on the vibrations of music, feeling the baseline in songs, and creating body percussion routines. We also found new and inclusive ways to help campers experiment with musical instruments.

By incorporating the use of supplies that explored and emphasized different textures, we adapted the visual arts program for those who are blind and visually impaired. We also focused on activities like pottery, where campers could shape and feel the impact they were having on the clay.



5. Children and youth living with Inflammatory Bowel Disease (Crohn's disease, colitis, and similar conditions) have the opportunity to attend **Camp Guts & Glory**. Some campers come with ostomies, an artificial opening of their bowel connected to a bag on the outside of their body. This can be quite a challenging experience for a young person, bringing with it feelings of embarrassment and alienation.

This summer, we had a first-time camper living with an ostomy, who had never met someone her own age with one. She was really looking forward to meeting other girls with ostomies and connecting with them. Unfortunately, there were no other female campers in her group who had ostomies.

Luckily, we were able to arrange an opportunity for her to meet another female camper and talk one-on-one about their experiences with ostomies. It was a great moment of connection and was exactly what this camper needed - to ask questions, share her feelings with someone who understood them, and know she isn't alone in her journey.

At the end of each week, campers receive a paper plate which has been specially decorated. Each of them is tailored to recognize what is fantastic about this particular camper, or highlights something they've accomplished during their time at Brigadoon. On the front, the catchy (often rhyming, alliterative, or silly) title summarizes what staff want to celebrate about this camper. On the back, a longer message tells the camper what we want them to remember about themselves and their time at camp.

GRIEF GROUP COORDINATOR

Before joining Brigadoon Village as Camp Solace's Grief Group Coordinator, I worked as a social worker with Hospice Halifax. While much of my work dealt with supporting adults and their families, I found working with children especially rewarding so was excited when I was presented with the opportunity to help support kids at Brigadoon.

Camp Solace is a week-long camp for kids from eight through 17 who have experienced the loss of someone in their immediate family. In addition to Brigadoon's usual fun and games, campers gather for an hour four times during their week. Here, kids of similar ages gather to work through their grief through special programming. By participating in theme-based activities, art, and movement, campers learn how to name the feelings they're experiencing, how to adapt to their life changes, and how to move forward while honouring their loved ones.

Children and youth who attend Camp Solace find tremendous connection with their peers. Mid-week, the campers come together for the Cairn Ceremony, an open forum where campers come together to memorialize their loved ones. For some, this can mean standing up and sharing a reflection with the group and for others, laying a stone in memory of their family member is how they more quietly take part in the ceremony.

It is such a privilege to witness the evolution of a camper's grief through this week of camp, and over the years that they come to Brigadoon. Our aim is to provide campers with skills and tools that will help them throughout the year. However, we know that grieving is complex, and campers may need ongoing support. Recognizing this, our Grief team is working on ways to make resources available for campers and caregivers after they leave Camp Solace.

From the moment I first arrived at Brigadoon Village as a camper nine years ago, my life was changed.

At Brigadoon, I found a place where I felt safe and comfortable, and where my confidence could grow. I spent five summers at Camp Treasure Chest. When my time came to graduate from camp, I was thrilled to have opportunities to continue to experience and make magic here.

After completing our Junior Counsellor program, I spent two summers as a Counsellor and Program Staff before becoming a Program Coordinator (PC). PCs oversee the development and implementation of programs and resources, and support other staff. I'm currently Program Coordinator for Music and Drama.
